REGULAR SITTINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Regular sittings of the City Council for 2022 will be held in the large hall of the Pointe-Valaine cultural and community centre at 85 Oxford Street in Otterburn Park. A single statement of account for unpaid municipal taxes will be sent to you after the fourth payment of the year. You can make your payments electronically on your financial institution's website. Simply add the Ville d'Otterburn Park as a vendor. The reference number to be used corresponds to the registration number indicated on your four detachable payment coupons at the bottom of your tax bill. You must enter all the numbers without the F or spaces.

PUBLIC WORKS

OUTDOOR FIREPLACES

Outdoor fireplaces are permitted in the Ville d'Otterburn Park exclusively in the case of a "detached single-family dwelling," a "health studio" or a "sugar shack."

It is permitted to light, feed or keep a fireplace running only between 7 p.m. and 2 a.m. for the period from May 1 to October 31. Only one appliance is allowed per lot and it must be equipped with a chimney and a spark arrester.

URBAN HENS

As the summer season approaches, here is a reminder of the by-laws on urban hens.

The keeping of hens is allowed in urban areas and can only be done on land where a detached single-family dwelling is erected.

- A minimum of two hens and a maximum of three hens are allowed per lot.
- Roosters are prohibited.
- · Hens in urban areas must be kept permanently inside an outdoor chicken coop.
- It is mandatory to obtain a building permit for the chicken coop.

GARAGE SALES

This year, garage sales are allowed on May 21, 22 and 23 as well as on September 3, 4 and 5. No fees or permits are required on those dates.

SPRING CLEANING

PRIVATE STREET LAMPS

Walking is a popular activity and, in order to ensure the safety of the people who walk or drive in our streets in the evening, we would like to remind you that it is the responsibility of each owner to ensure the maintenance and proper functioning of their private street lamp.

Private street lamps must be equipped with a special device ensuring the automatic operation of the lighting and the bulb must be changed regularly.

SPEED ON THE STREETS

Thus, you will see on the City's various platforms the return of the advertisements in the "Driving slowly is safer" awareness campaign. The City is committed to the safety of its residents. This campaign aims to improve user-friendliness between users of the different modes of transportation and encourage the safe sharing of public roads.

The campaign, which specifically targets motorists, has as its primary objective the awareness of compliance with speed limits. In particular, it recommends careful driving near school zones and when approaching pedestrian crossings.



VISIBILITY TRIANGLE

Spring is a great opportunity to clear street corners to increase the visibility of intersections. You will contribute to the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and motorists.

The visibility triangle is the triangular-shaped space near the intersection of street lines, on corner properties. Two sides of this triangle are formed by the street lines and their extension up to the meeting point of the extension of said street lines. The third side of the triangle is a straight line joining the ends of the other two sides.

At all times, the installation of fences, low walls, hedges, access gates, car shelters and signs are prohibited inside the visibility triangle.

The Ville d'Otterburn Park takes saving drinking water to heart. That's why we would like to remind you of some rules on the topic.

Only manual watering of vegetable gardens and edible plants, gardens and flowers is authorized during a do-not-water advisory issued by the City or the Régie intermunicipale de l'Eau de la Vallée-du-Richelieu.

FREE WATER SAVING KITS

As part of World Water Day last March, the City purchased 50 water- and-energy-saving fixed rainfall showerhead kits approved by WaterSense® through financial assistance from Hydro-Québec.

We are distributing them to residents to raise their awareness about drinking water waste and encourage them to acquire more efficient appliances that save water, energy and electricity costs. 110 TREES GIVEN TO CITIZENS!

To mark Earth Day, on April 23, the City distributed 110 trees of about two meters in height to Otterburn Park residents free of charge.

A follow-up of the tree survival and satisfaction rates of participants in the spring 2021 tree donations concluded that the activity had been a great success!

Remember that trees play an essential role in the balance of biodiversity and provide essential services for humans. For example, they improve the quality of soil, groundwater and air by filtration and by sequestering suspended solids and polluting gases. Trees also promote deep water infiltration and fight against surface runoff. They mitigate the phenomenon of urban heat islands by lowering the ambient temperature.

In addition, they serve as a habitat for various species, such as mammals, birds, insects, lichens and mosses.

It should be noted that the event was organized in such a way as to encourage local businesses and supply food for volunteers.

CLEANING THE BOISÉ DES BOSQUETS: THANK YOU!

On Sunday, May 1, 2022, the clean-up of the Boisé des Bosquets took place. More than 50 volunteers collected garbage and dead branches on the 7 km of wooded trails and around the buildings. The event was organized in collaboration with the Papillon Foundation. Coffee, breakfast and dinner were served to volunteers, courtesy of the Papillon Foundation.

Plastic waste such as bags, bottles or packaging is a serious threat to our ecosystems. Plastic can be consumed by accident and enter the food chain. It accumulates in our body through the foods we eat. More than 8 million tons of plastic are thrown into the ocean every year. Plastic pollution is a global issue for which we all have individual power to make smart choices as consumers and participate in clean-ups.

LET'S TAKE UP THE DANDELION CHALLENGE!

Otterburn Park, a bee-friendly town, is sensitive to the difficulties experienced by pollinators. That's why we are proud to participate in the Dandelion Challenge, an initiative of Miel et co. We will postpone mowing parks and green spaces until the beginning of June so our dandelions can be the first source of abundant and vital food for bees and other pollinating insects.

Residents are encouraged to follow suit and delay mowing their lawns. Free posters can be picked up at City Hall so you can proudly demonstrate your involvement. You will also see new signs in our parks.

The City will leave the grass in parks and green spaces longer starting this summer to make it more vigorous, promote drought resistance and pollinator diversity by keeping low flowers in addition to fighting ragweed.

REMARKABLE TREES

In collaboration with the Centre de la Nature du Mont-Saint-Hilaire, the City continues to monitor its 323 remarkable trees through field visits of eco-advisors and photo-interpretation.

We ask for the co-operation of residents in this project to protect these majestic trees in our area. A relatively high number of remarkable trees are found in Les Bosquets woods. The City is therefore asking for a responsible use of the woods by hikers, but also by the neighbours of the woods, who share their property limits with Les Bosquets woods. An interactive map will be put online by the fall, which will allow citizens to know when they see a remarkable tree!

LYME DISEASE

Lyme disease is transmitted to humans through the bite of black-legged infected ticks.

Symptoms of Lyme disease include:

- a skin rash
- headaches;
- fever or chills;
- fatigue;
- spasms or weakness;
- numbness or tingling;
- swollen lymph nodes:
- oval-shaped organs found anywhere in the body, such as the armpit or stomach.

Prevention

The best way to protect yourself from Lyme disease is to prevent tick bites.

If you venture into the woods or brush:

- wear closed shoes, a sweater, a long-sleeved shirt or blouse and long pants;
- pull up your socks over the bottom of your pants;
- wear light-coloured clothing to make it easier to spot ticks;
- use insect repellent containing DEET (active ingredient that keeps insects away) or icaridin (always follow the instructions for use);
- shower or bathe within two hours of each outdoor outing to get rid of unattached ticks;
- do a daily check-up for ticks all over your body, and check children and pets as well.

Treatments

If Lyme disease is left untreated, symptoms can last for months or even years. Two to four weeks of antibiotic treatment is effective in treating most cases of Lyme disease. Longer courses of antibiotics may be required depending on the symptoms and when the disease is diagnosed. If you have symptoms, see a health care provider as soon as possible. Also consult a doctor if you do not feel well in the weeks following a tick bite. The sooner you receive treatment, the faster you will recover.

THE FIGHT AGAINST RAGWEED CONCERNS US ALL!

The City has received financial assistance from the Minister of Health and Social Services under the plan for a green economy 2030 – Health component for the implementation of a project aimed to develop and carry out a plan to control allergenic pollens in its region.

Pollens from certain species of trees, grasses or weeds are spread through the air in the form of fine dust and are the main causes of seasonal allergic rhinitis. Among the different species of allergenic pollen, ragweed is the most important cause of seasonal allergic rhinitis in all of northeastern North America.

In Otterburn Park, as in most municipalities, ragweed is present on residents' land, along roadsides, streams, railways and vacant lots. In order to take effective and concrete action for the control of ragweed on the territory, the City has to count on the participation of residents and its teams.

A MOMENT OF HISTORY

Canadian National Viaducts, by Alain Côté Société d'histoire et de généalogie de Beloeil-Mont-Saint-Hilaire

Viaducts have always played an important role in the design of the railway system in this country. Typically, they are used to run the railway over a watercourse or road. This kind of infrastructure existed in the Belœil–Mont-Saint-Hilaire region. However, such construction, due to the narrowness of the road crossing, could be risky for vehicle users and passers-by.


Already in 1938, the municipal council of the parish of Saint-Hilaire complained to Vincent Dupuis, federal MP for Chambly-Rouville, about the dangerous condition of the viaduct that spans the road, at the intersection of Prince Edward Street and the waterfront road (now Chemin des Patriotes).

It seems that no changes have been made because, in the early 1960s, the Chamber of Commerce of the region complained that nothing had been done. It was not until the following decade that work progressed. In the July 12, 1972, edition of L'Œil Régional, Yvon L'Heureux, Liberal MP for the Chambly riding in the House of Commons, declared that he would no longer tolerated the many problems caused by viaducts. He adds that the lives of pedestrians were continually endangered. This type of infrastructure was also the scene of accidents causing damage to large trucks that entered a too narrow passage.

In the September 6, 1972, edition of L'Œil Régional, Bernard Pinard, Minister of Highways and Public Works, granted \$500,000 for the construction of a new tunnel on Route 21 (Chemin des Patriotes) between Otterburn Park and Mont-Saint-Hilaire. The cost of the work was shared between the Canadian Transport Commission, the Ministère de la Voirie du Québec and Canadian National Railways. The planned six-months of work included a new 36 feet (11 m) wide road and, on each side of the road, a 5-foot (1.5 m) sidewalk.

After several decades, with the increase in road traffic, the viaduct issue became more and more urgent to resolve. Thanks to the many interventions of the local MPs, the situation was eventually corrected, ensuring that the passage under these road infrastructures was safer for the public.

"La quête: ces soldats du régiment de Carignan-Salières qui ont peuplé la Nouvelle France" ("The Quest: Soldiers of the Carignan-Salières Regiment who populated New France")

Paul Lavigne will tell the story of the Carignan-Salières regiment by reliving the journey of André Poutré dit Lavigne. This historical figure, an apprentice shoemaker born in a small village in north-eastern France, and his fellow soldiers responded to the call of King Louis XIV to embark for New France to protect the inhabitants of the colony from attacks by the Mohawks. Perilous crossing, building forts, clearing land and meetings with the Filles du Roy are all fragments of history and anecdotes that reflect the joys, hazards and upheavals of the daily life of the time.
