

SLOWING DOWN IS A SMART CHOICE

The Ville d'Otterburn Park is rolling out a speed awareness campaign called "Ralentir, un choix intelligent." On our streets, every gesture counts. Slowing down means protecting our children, elderly, cyclists and quality of life.

For a number of months, the City has been taking concrete action to make its streets safer:

- · Installation of bollards in some residential areas:
- Rollout of mobile radar, according to an established plan, to raise drivers' awareness about their speed;
- · Cycling education event held last May for children;
- Rapid flashing lights are expected to be installed by the end of the year at the corners of Spiller / Prince Arthur and Connaught.

To provide a framework for these actions and respond more effectively to residents' concerns, the City has also adopted a new policy for processing requests related to road safety and walking/cycling. This policy has two main objectives:

- · Improve connectivity among neighbourhoods, parks and surrounding cities;
- · Encourage and ensure the safety of walkers and cyclists.

Otterburn Park proposes a clear, structured and fair process for analyzing residents' requests, evaluating appropriate measures and ensuring transparent follow-up.

URBAN PLANNING AND ENVIRONMENT

SWIMMING POOL

According to current regulations, all residential pools built before November1, 2010, must comply with current safety standards by September30, 2025, at the latest. These standards were put in place to enhance safety around residential pools, particularly to prevent the risk of drowning of young children. They include, among other things, the installation of compliant fencing, security devices and appropriate access controls.

All pool owners concerned should check to see whether their installation complies with current requirements.

PRIVATE STREET LIGHTS

Walking is a popular activity, and to ensure the safety of people who walk on our streets in the evening, we would like to remind you that it is the responsibility of each owner to ensure the maintenance and proper functioning of their private streetlight. The bulb must be equipped with a special device to ensure the automatic operation of the lighting and the bulb must be changed regularly.

BASKETBALL HOOPS

Summer is a great opportunity for our young people to put away their screens and enjoy the good weather by engaging in physical activities. However, it is important to note that basketball hoops, or any other similar objects, are prohibited on public roads where there are lanes intended for car traffic. In the event that such equipment inconveniences you, please contact the Régie intermunicipale de police Richelieu-Saint-Laurent. Moreover, no one may play on public roads where there are lanes for automobile traffic unless they are expressly authorized to do so by the "Dans ma rue, on joue!" (on my street, we play) program. You can contact the municipality if you would like more information about joining this program.

EFFECTIVELY MANAGING YOUR RESIDUAL MATERIALS:

A SIMPLE GESTURE WITH A BIG IMPACT!

Thank you for doing your part for a clean, sustainable and respectful living environment! In order to keep our city clean and pleasant to live in, each resident must know and adhere to the rules for the various collections (garbage, recycling, organic and bulky waste).

BULKY OBJECTS

Bulky objects that do not go in the garbage or recycling (e.g., furniture, mattresses, appliances without refrigerant) must be dropped off during the specific collections organized by La Vallée-du-Richelieu RCM.

Advance registration is necessary to use this service.

ECOCENTRE

To dispose of your bulky items between collections, the Mont-Saint-Hilaire ecocentre is open a number of days a week: mrcvr.ca/services/matieres-residuelles/ecocentre

Reminder: It is prohibited to place bulky items or garbage bags at the curb outside collection periods. Doing so is detrimental to cleanliness, the environment and everyone's safety.

RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

A maximum of two recreational vehicles, not exceeding 10 metres in length, may be parked or stored on a lot. Between April 1 and October 31 of the same year, only one recreational vehicle or similar equipment may be parked on the property, in the front or secondary front yard. Parking of the second recreational vehicle or similar equipment is permitted only in the side yard or rear yard. Between November 1 and March 31 of the following year, the storage of any recreational vehicle or similar equipment is only permitted in the side yard or rear yard.

TIME CHANGE AND CHECKING SMOKE ALARMS

ON THE NIGHT OF NOVEMBER 1 TO 2, IT WILL BE TIME TO SET BACK OUR CLOCKS.

The Régie intermunicipale de sécurité incendie strongly recommends that you take the opportunity to check your smoke alarms and fill out the self-verification form on fire safety factors on the RISIVR website at risivr.ca/bureau-de-prevention/pvaf/ or by scanning the QR code. This exercise will only take a few minutes of your time and is essential for your safety. Individuals who complete the self-verification form are automatically entered into the prize drawings.

BRANCH COLLECTION

(NO RESERVATION REQUIRED)

Otterburn Park will begin collecting branches for the fall from the first week of October. Branches can be placed on the shoulder of the road between 6 p.m. the day before and 7 a.m. on the Monday when the collection begins, or Tuesday if Monday is a public holiday such as October 13.

IT IS NOT PERMITTED TO STORE BRANCHES IN YOUR FRONT YARD UNTIL IT IS TIME FOR THE OCTOBER COLLECTION.

To be collected, branches must be less than 4 inches in diameter, left full length, and not tied. The trunks must point towards the street and be placed on the shoulder of the road.

- Branches of hedges or of ornamental trees of a normal size;
- Piles of branches from felling or severe pruning;
- Stumps.

QUANTITY

The maximum quantity of branches must not exceed a volume of 4 m³ (1.25 m X 1.25 m X 2.5 m), which is the equivalent of a small trailer 8 feet long by 4 feet wide and 4 feet high. Failure to comply with this limit will result in the suspension of the collection. We will charge you for the extra work required further to YOUR acceptance.

REFUSED

Thorny branches (e.g., hawthorn, rose) and vines can cause injury during chipping.

ECOCENTRE


Other than on Otterburn Park's branch collection days, residents can dispose of their branches at the regional ecocentre, at 60 Fisher Street. Mont-Saint-Hilaire.

RICHELIEU RIVER

Otterburn Park enjoys its proximity to the Richelieu River. Do you know its history?

The Ville d'Otterburn Park, located near the Richelieu River, has a history linked to this crucial waterway which has been used by Indigenous peoples, settlers and farmers for centuries. Today, the river offers natural beauty and is home to a variety of aquatic fauna, including rare species such as the snapping turtle and the copper redhorse, which is unique to Quebec. However, the river faces threats such as fragmentation of the natural environment, siltation and pollution. It is essential to respect riparian areas, navigate responsibly and understand local species to protect biodiversity.

This summer, Connexion Nature, COVABAR, the Comité ZIP du Lac Saint-Pierre and W8banaki are patrolling the river to raise awareness of its preservation. And good news: 12 new routes on the Route Bleue will allow you to explore the Richelieu by canoe, kayak or stand-up paddle (SUP) board, in complete safety.

Let's save water together!

As part of the Réseau Écon'eau network, the Ville d'Otterburn Park would like residents to do a simple test to help identify leaks in the network.

Here's a quick test you can do at home:

- 1. Turn off all faucets and appliances that use water (e.g., washer, dishwasher).
- 2. Go to the water service entrance (usually in the basement).
- 3. Listen closely. If you hear a constant whistling sound, even if everything is shut off, it could be a leak in the system.
- 4. Contact the Citizen Office at 450-536-0303 or by email at info@opark.ca if you find a leak.

80th anniversaryof Auclair Legion 121 and the Liberation of the Netherlands

The year 2025 marks the 80th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Legion Auclair 121, but also that of the Liberation of the Netherlands. We thought it would be a good idea to talk about it in order to remember the people from here who fought overseas.

It was on October 24, 1945 that Auclair Legion 121 of Otterburn Park obtained its charter. The branch owes its name to the family of Arsène and Maria née Lapointe, two of whose five sons fought in the Second World War and lost their lives while serving: Roch and Jean-Jacques. At that time, Anglophones, who formed the majority in Otterburn Park, remained strongly attached to the United Kingdom, which they considered their mother country. In 1946, the Legion acquired a building on Connaught Street where they gathered to "provide essential services in our communities" and "remember the men and women who sacrificed their lives for our country."

Moreover, May 5, 1945 is considered Liberation Day in the Netherlands, and it is Dutch Heritage Day in Canada. In the Netherlands, "the Dutch people continue to take part in events and ceremonies honouring the more than 7,600 Canadians who died liberating the country." In gratitude for the liberation of Holland, thousands of tulips bloom each spring in Ottawa, a gift from the Dutch royal family and the Dutch people.

A word about the post-war period. As in many European cities, chaos reigned in the Netherlands. Countless houses, factories and buildings were destroyed or damaged. "Rotterdam, now one of the most innovative cities in the Netherlands, had been almost completely razed to the ground by bombing." The violence of the fighting left bridges, roads and railways in very poor condition throughout the country.

Recently, we were contacted by Jan Meijer, a student of military history in Amsterdam. He lives near the village of Cuijk in the Netherlands and has a great interest in the Canadian Army during the Second World War. He was looking for information about Lucien Rouisse. Our research has allowed us to identify him. Lucien Rouisse was born in Beloeil on January 9, 1926. He was the son of Georges Rouisse and Germaine Casavant. The family was only passing through, as a few months later, they moved to Montreal. When he enlisted in the Fusiliers Mont-Royal, he stated that he was a day labourer and lived in Saint-Calixte de Kilkenny (Lanaudière region). He was killed accidentally in Cuijk, in the Netherlands, by a German bazooka while training at a non-commissioned officer school on February 5, 1945. He is buried in the Canadian War Cemetery in Nijmegen, 4 miles southeast of Nijmegen, Holland.

But how many men from our area were called up for military service? We will probably never know precisely. According to Pierre Lambert, "the number [...] of people who fought overseas is probably about 150. That is a heavy price paid for a conflict that began thousands of miles away."
